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EDITORIAL.

We have to thank Mr. Fawcett for presenting to the School a very handsome carved old oak chair, which will stand on the Hall platform and be used by the Head Mistress.

This Term Miss Gwynne Kimpton has offered two Scholarships to be competed for by girls in the School, one for viola and one for violoncello. The candidates were tested by Miss Kimpton on July 22nd. The Scholarship for violoncello was gained by Barbara Marsden, that for the viola has not yet been awarded.

The sum of £10 16s. 7d. has been received by Miss Bell from parents and friends of the School towards the Mary Gurney Scholarship Fund, details of which appeared in our last issue. This amount, together with the sum produced by performance of "The Tempest," brings the Sutton contribution towards the Fund up to a total of £40. The Fund is still open, and further contributions will be gladly received by Miss Bell.

We give below the details of the Mary Gurney School Scholarship:—

Miss Gurney, by her will, gave £500 and her 10 Shares in the Girls' Public Day School Trust, in trust, to apply the income "in bestowing a Scholarship or Scholarships to be held by a senior girl or senior girls attending one or other of the Trust Schools, such Scholarship or Scholarships to be subject to such rules and regulations as the Council in their absolute discretion think fit."

It is understood that the present annual income will be about £26 per annum, which sum will accrue for the first time in the autumn Term, 1919. The Council have prepared the following scheme for the Scholarship:—

- I. The Scholarship shall be called the "Mary Gurney School Scholarship."
- II. It shall be awarded annually, and be tenable for a period of two years, beginning with the Autumn Term, 1919.*
- III. It shall be open to all the Schools of the Trust.
- IV. Candidates must have been in a School of the Trust for at least two years, and have passed one of the approved "First" Examinations.
- V. The award shall be made by the Education Committee after considering a special report on the merits of each candidate by her Head Mistress.
- VI. If the selected candidate is not in need of pecuniary assistance, or holds a Scholarship or Exhibition in the School which she desires to keep, she shall, while retaining the honour of the "Mary Gurney School Scholarship," relinquish the money to the next best candidate who is not similarly barred.
- VII. The continued holding of the Scholarship shall be subject to a satisfactory terminal Certificate by the Head Mistress as to attendance, conduct, and progress in studies. In default of such a certificate, or in case of discontinuance by the scholar of the regular School Course, the Scholarship may be reduced in amount, or suspended, or entirely withdrawn, in the absolute discretion of the Education Committee.
- VIII. The Council shall have power to alter this scheme after due notice.

* Each scholar will therefore receive about £13 per annum.

Weather Report.

War Savings Association.

This Term £176 5s. have been collected.

The Association has now bought altogether 1,499 Certificates (£1,161 14s. 6d.).

During the week July 13th—20th, a special effort was made by the East Surrey War Savings Association to collect money to replace "The Vindictive."

Mr. Harold Spender addressed the School on Monday, July 15th, on the need for saving, and his eloquence added several new members to our list. We collected altogether £111 16s.

Vegetable Products.

This Term 26 cases and six sacks of vegetables have been sent to the Fleet, and the donations from the School amount to £9 2s. 3d. During the holidays vegetables were sent direct from a shop every week, and the supply was kept up. This Term the Forms have been placed in order each week, according to the amount of vegetables and subscriptions brought.

Several Old Girls have sent contributions. All fruit and all vegetables, excepting potatoes, are wanted badly, and should be sent to the School on Tuesday mornings. It would help very much if more Old Girls could send contributions.

This year Miss Bell has allowed the strip of ground by the netball courts to be planted with vegetables for the Fleet. Under Mrs. Burmester's direction the grass was dug up, and onion, artichoke, radish, carrot, beetroot, bean, and turnip seeds were planted, and young cabbage and sprout plants were put in.

Miss Barrow has taken the place of Mrs. Burmester (Miss Rose) as acting secretary. Miss Tayton has undertaken the accounts. Ruth Collins (who is leaving this Term) has done much valuable work. She undertook the cultivation of the Navy Plot in the School garden with great success, and has been responsible each week for the packing of vegetables, etc., sent away.
